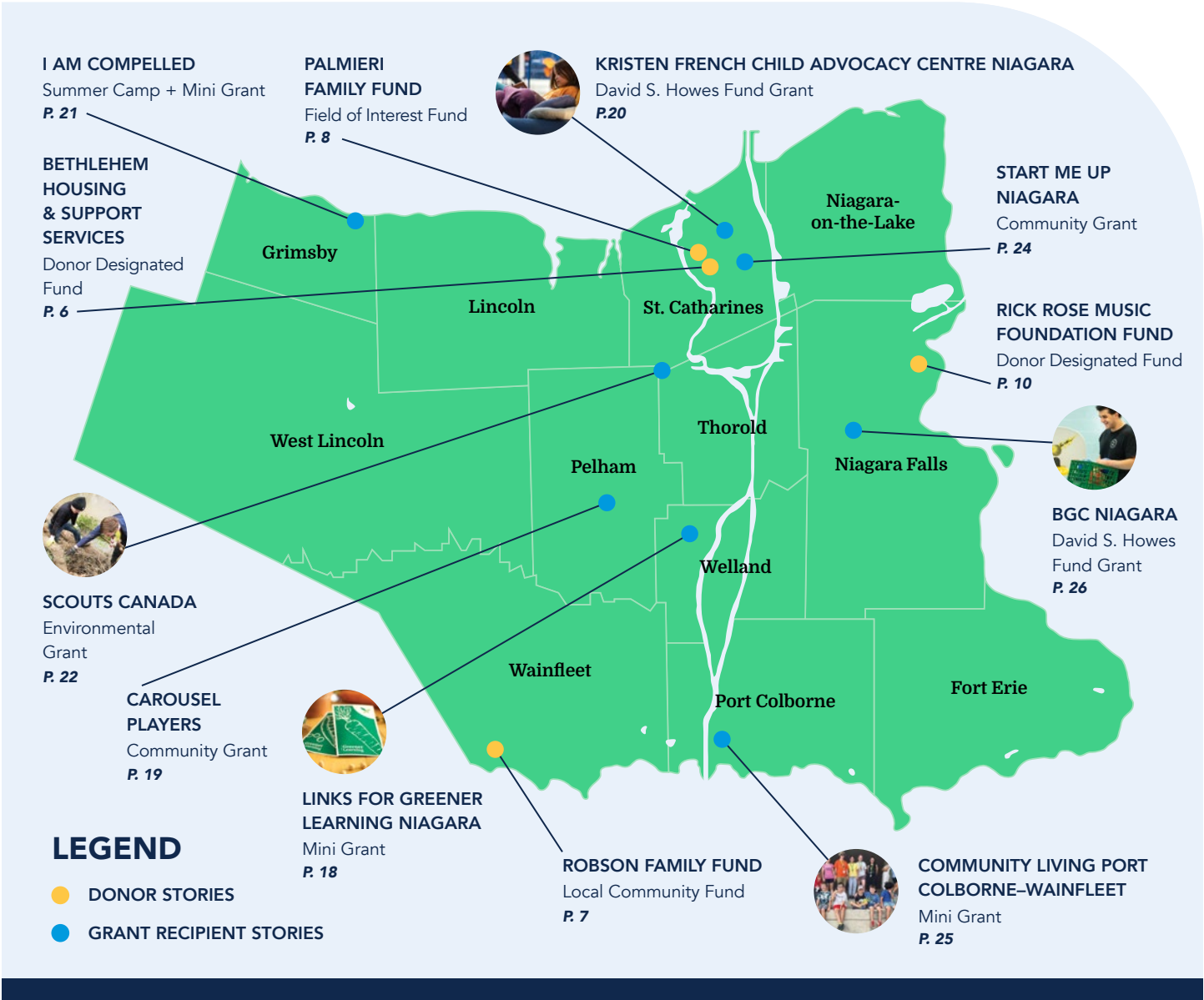

Introduction

Executive Message

2024 was a year unlike any other for NCF—achieving milestones that we could barely have imagined even a few years ago. Our total assets pole vaulted over the \$92.5 mark allowing us to make our largest annual grant dispersals of over \$3.8 million into the charitable sector.

So much has been accomplished by this organization in just our 24 years. But with celebration comes reflection and the reality that 2024 was a year where our community bared some significant losses. NCF’s founding Executive Director Liz Palmieri lost her valiant battle with cancer (we honour Liz on **page 8**). We also note the passing of a number of extremely close friends and partners including colleagues, fund holders, committee members and community leaders. We acknowledge and celebrate their enduring contributions to our own organization & will always be grateful that their lives touched our own.

As an organization that proudly serves all 12 municipalities and is one of the largest funders in Niagara, our focus has been and will continue to prioritize our support of the charitable sector through our work with our partners and stakeholders. Here are some of the highlights of our impact in Niagara for 2024:

- Grants of over **\$3.8 million** dollars bringing our historical tally to over **\$32 million** dollars to Niagara’s charitable since our inception in 2000;
- Another impactful deployment of significant dollars through our Environmental Grants thanks in large part to **Dorothea Thomas Foundation**. Grants to 11 projects totaling just over \$200,000 in support of environmental projects focusing on protection, preservation & rehabilitation of our environment & natural habitat;
- The seventh annual grant dispersal from the **David S. Howes Fund** with 36 requests totaling \$2.4 million dollars. Eighteen (18) new projects representing \$742,000 were approved. Since the creation of the Fund in 2017, over **\$5 million** dollars has been deployed throughout the region;
- The **Governance Coaching Program (GCP)** continues to empower the charitable sector. The organizations selected in 2024 included: Cave Springs Camp, Child’s View, Heartland Forest, Learning Disabilities Association of Niagara Region, Leadership Niagara & Niagara Parks Foundation;
- NCF continued its partnership with **Armstrong Strategy Group (ASG)** in delivering LOCAL fundraising professional development seminar sessions open to any local charity or non-profit. Over 200 individual attendees attended four sessions throughout 2024;

- NCF was proud to **sponsor a number of initiatives** including, Future Black Female, TOES Niagara, Links for Greener Learning, Niagara Regional Native Centre’s Annual Pow Wow and Leadership Niagara;
- Finally, NCF completed the process of launching our new **Strategic Plan** that will guide the actions and impact of our organization for the coming years.

When the Foundation’s AGM is held in Spring 2025, Louise Veres (Pelham) will complete her term as a Director. Louise served as Chair of our Grants Committee over the last number of years; leading the extensive work that Committee does in reviewing and making millions’ of dollars of Grant recommendations to our Board. Our gratitude to Rashmi Biswas (St. Catharines) who stepped off of our Board just ahead of the conclusion of her term for her time as a Director and as a powerhouse member of our Governance Committee. We also pause to recognize the retirement from the NCF Board of former Board Chair Damian Goulbourne (Welland) who expertly guided the Foundation during the pandemic and subsequent recovery, keeping the Board and Staff in lock-step. Losing such strong leaders and voices around our Board table is only lessened in the knowledge of the wonderful new Directors who will take their seats and bring their own expertise, experience and passion.

The Spring AGM will also usher in new leadership at the Board level as Chair Michael Mann (Pelham) will pass the torch to Mike Lethby (St. Catharines). Michael’s steadfast leadership guided us to continued growth and success. His attention to detail and unwavering support of the staff team and his Board colleagues is a testament of his leadership and character.

Like 2024, 2025 brings its fair share of excitement and challenges. Already the first few months have been “interesting” with political waves causing uncertainty...to say the least. But there is much to look forward to as we take some time note and celebrate NCF’s 25th Anniversary. A major milestone for our small, but mighty organization. Our Foundation has been built on the foundation of so many who have come before us and some who are no longer with us. We are excited to celebrate all of it in the months to come!

Endowment Funds

NCF is Niagara’s philanthropic partner since 2000, connecting donors to causes, and communities to resources.

We do this by helping donors create permanent, yet flexible, income-earning endowment funds that benefit the people of Niagara and fulfill the philanthropic objectives of individual donors. We help donors give a charitable gift that will not only make an impact on the community today, but will leave a legacy in Niagara for generations to come.

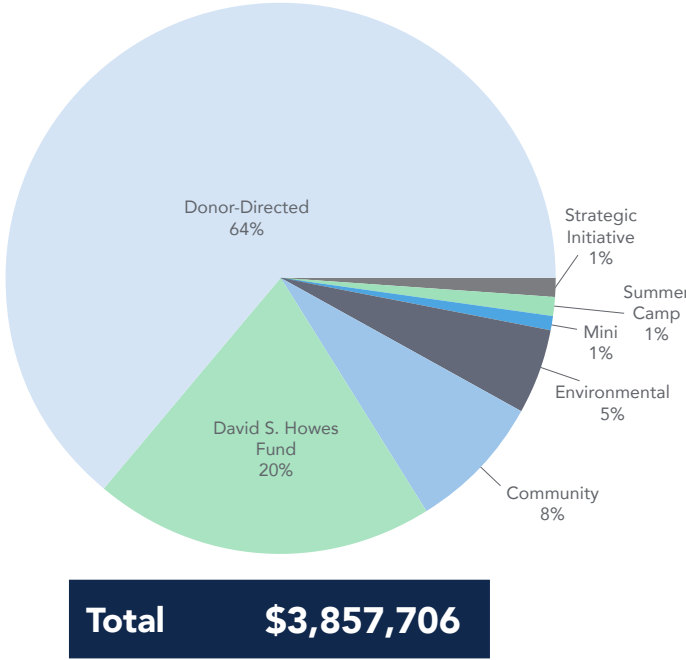
TYPES OF FUNDS & GRANT STREAMS

NCF has a variety of funds available for our donors to consider, tailor made to meet their financial goals and philanthropic wishes. Many of them are open funds where gifts can be made by any interested contributor, at any time, allowing every gift to make a difference.

There are many triggers that prompt a donor to establish a fund—in memory of a loved one, leaving a gift in their Will, as an alternative to opening up a family foundation, and many more. No matter the scenario, we know that each and every donor comes to us with great intention, and it is our privilege to help turn that intent into impact.

Below is a summary of the various types of funds available and how they contribute to NCF’s grant making capacity.

2024 GRANTS



BETHLEHEM HOUSING & SUPPORT SERVICES RENT STABILIZATION FUND

Banking On Housing

A mother on social assistance, struggling to afford both rent and the care her child with special needs required, faced eviction while waiting for affordable housing.

A young man, orphaned and living with mobility challenges, risked losing the only home he had ever known after losing his parents.

For both, the new **Rotary Club of St. Catharines Bethlehem Housing & Support Services Rent Stabilization Fund** provided stability that kept them housed and offered a sustainable path forward.

The donor-directed fund, established with a \$500,000 endowment from the Rotary Club of St. Catharines to mark its centenary, functions like a rent bank. It removes financial barriers to housing by covering moving expenses, last month's rent deposit or rent arrears for eligible individuals and families.

For the mother, who fell behind trying to afford \$1,600 rent on an income that might reach \$2,000 in a good month, the fund paid for half her arrears. That support allowed her to arrange a manageable repayment plan with her landlord for the remainder.

"With the rent bank assistance, it's helped to stabilize her life and save her housing," said Lori Beech, Bethlehem Housing Executive Director.

For the young man who lost his parents, the fund offered him the lifeline of a rent subsidy as he shores up other means to live independently.

The endowment was the largest donation in the Rotary Club's history. Managed by the Niagara Community Foundation (NCF), it will generate an annual income distribution overseen by Bethlehem Housing to help families stay housed.

Supporting affordable housing fit with Rotary's mission when the club began work in 2010 on how best to mark its 100th anniversary in 2021. Establishing a rent bank in 2024 with the NCF's help promised quick and clear impact, explained Margaret Jarrell, chair of the club's centennial committee.

"It's very difficult to work on other issues in your life if you don't have save and stable housing, so this fund helps one get there," Jarrell said.

"We did this with the Niagara Community Foundation because we knew it would be well-managed and we knew Bethlehem Housing could make the fund work as well as possible," she added. "Every club member is happy to help the community in this way."

IN MEMORY

Charity Begins at Home

When Kelly and Patrick Robson established the Robson Family Fund as part of the Niagara Community Foundation's Wainfleet Fund in 2012, they did it out of passion for their community and a way to give back.

Patrick passed away in August of 2024 after a short and valiant battle with cancer. This tremendous loss was shocking to his family, friends, colleagues and students. To honour his memory, many chose to donate to their family fund, which doubled the original size of the endowment that will benefit Wainfleet in perpetuity.

Seeing the way in which Patrick's legacy is being honoured has touched Kelly and her family deeply in the midst of their sorrow and grief. The outpouring of generosity and kindness to the fund "overwhelms us with gratitude, and is a testament to the many lives my husband touched", says Kelly.

Patrick humbly served the community both at the forefront and behind the scenes: as a politician, an educator, an environmentalist, a civil servant, and a volunteer. His roots were deep in Niagara in general and Wainfleet in particular, as it is where he and Kelly settled and built their life on a property that holds much family history.

The **Robson Family Fund** started small and grew slowly, meant to benefit their community and inspire others to do the same, Kelly said. You don't need to be wealthy. Just do what you can to make your community "a better place to live, work and play." "The fund has given us the opportunity to support the charitable organizations we value, not only today but for the future of the community."

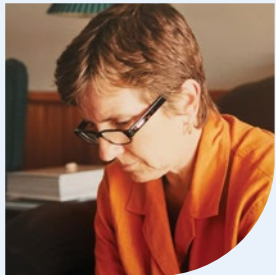

Putting the Fun Into Philanthropy

Elizabeth (Liz) Anne Palmieri

MAY 5, 1951—SEPTEMBER 1, 2024

Liz Palmieri was funny and fun-loving. She was detail-oriented and determined. She was brave and unconventional, but she also knew how to be collaborative and diplomatic, and how to work the system. But most importantly, she was caring. Liz made caring for her community her life's work.

When Liz died of leukemia in September 2024, the Niagara community that had benefited from decades of her passion, poured that affection back, with gifts in her honour to the **Palmieri Family Fund** at the Niagara Community Foundation.

The generosity was heartwarming, said Sara Palmieri, one of Liz's three children. Sara said the children weren't aware that their parents, Liz and Adrian, had created the fund, but that its existence is in keeping with their mother's vision and character "and it feels amazing to see how her legacy will continue to live on. It's a testament to who she was at her essence as she is still giving back to our community."

From 2000 to 2016, Liz served as the Niagara Community Foundation's founding executive director. Liz's love for her community was something her family saw in action, and they had a front row seat to how she did it.

"My mom was always quite determined but in a gentle way," Sara said. She had big ideas about what could and should happen, "but she was also very pragmatic and systematic in her approach." Her post-secondary education, which saw her graduate as only one of three women in Mohawk College's brand-new computer science program in the late 1960s, gave Liz powerful systems tools but was also an apt foreshadowing of her lifelong willingness to take chances with bold, yet well-thought-out, steps.

"My mom knew that even if you can't see the end result, there is always going to be a path," Sara said. "And that's what made her so good at what she did. She would consider all aspects of something and then formulate a plan. Would it always work? No. But I always got the sense from her that there wasn't anything that she couldn't do."

Not only did Liz work to bring resources together to benefit charitable causes, she inspired people with her vision of philanthropy. She made it her mission to make sure everyone knew they could be a philanthropist—no matter their means. She had fun doing it and she did it until the very end. Just months before she died, she recorded a radio conversation about her philosophy. "Philanthropy is simply generosity towards humanity," she explained. "It's sharing of your time and resources in a way that makes sense" and anyone can do it. In her work, Liz wasn't asking people for a handout, she was giving them opportunities to participate in something big and good.

"When you talk to a donor about what they are interested in, it becomes fun," she explained in the interview.

Liz's family is grateful that her sense of fun and her caring for her community can live on.

"Philanthropy's true meaning is the effort or inclination to increase the well-being of humanity," Sara said.

"Simply, it's caring for your community. And we need more of that now than ever."

Honoring A Musical Legacy

Rick Rose (Maiuri) made his mark in Nashville, penning songs for Sony Music about matters of the heart.

But those closest to the accomplished musician and founder of the Niagara Institute of Music and the Arts (NIOMA) say his own heart was always in Niagara.

Rick remained deeply connected to Niagara’s music scene. He championed local musicians, supported festivals, and contributed to musical productions at Saint Paul High School, where his children, Melanie and Jake, studied and where Jake now teaches.

That’s why, when Rick passed away in July 2024, his family established the **Rick Rose Music Foundation Fund** with the Niagara Community Foundation.

“He was known as the local music man, a local hero,” said Rosa, Rick’s wife. “We want to keep that legacy going and the passion he had in it.”

The donor-directed scholarship fund will support local students of all ages who want to pursue music lessons at the school of their choice, covering instruction fees or equipment expenses.

The family will also provide scholarships to graduating high school students, who intend to study music in college or university. The first scholarships will be awarded in Niagara Falls, where the family lives. Plans are to expand in the coming years.

The fund itself will be sustained by donations through the NCF or NIOMA, and tribute concerts and events.

Despite the emotion involved, establishing a fund in Rick’s honour was an easy process with NCF, Rosa said.

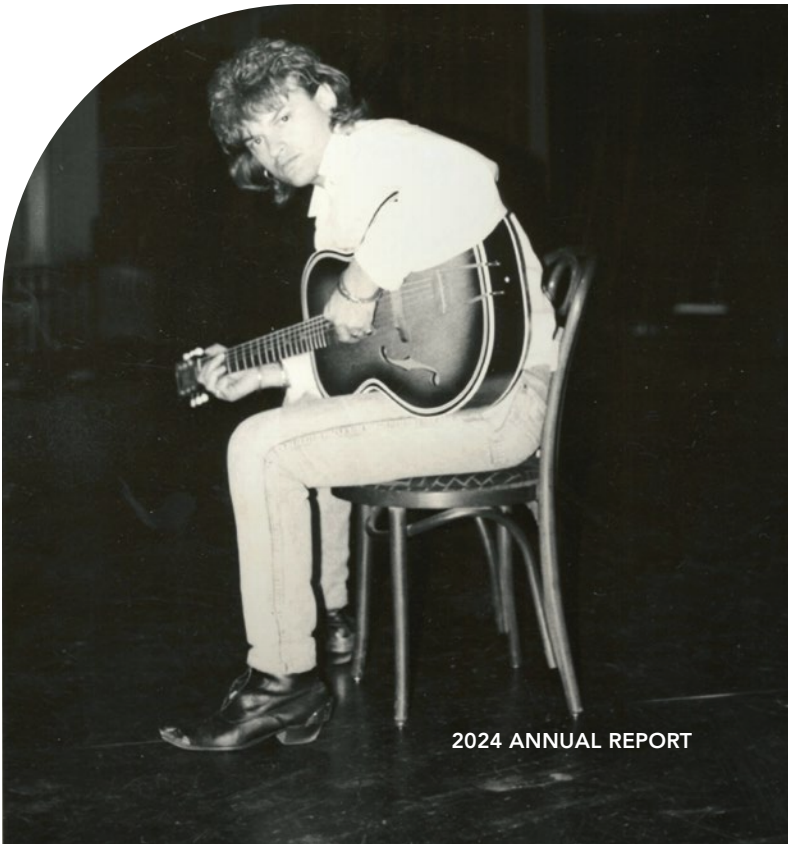

“Our initial meeting we were grieving this huge loss of a wonderful husband, dad and papa and [Executive Director Bryan Rose] made it so comfortable for us,” she said. “He took the time to explain how everything works and what we’re going to do together as a team. It’s been a smooth process.”

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Making Food Sovereignty More Accessible

The act of growing plants for food is an age-old practice.

Thanks to the help from an NCF **Mini Grant**, Links for Greener Learning Niagara is ensuring it remains an activity for all ages by building raised beds at its Welland community garden.

These aren't just any raised beds, however. The garden already had plots built tall enough to reduce bending and make this summertime ritual easier for older adults and those with mobility issues. But after eight years of use—often by the same gardeners year after year—the existing raised beds were due for replacing and with something that matched the evolving needs of the people using them.

They will be able to garden in a nicer way now. They don't have to bend and they can move around the bed more easily.

With **\$1,500** from NCF, Links for Greener Living constructed raised beds that stand a little higher than the originals. They have a seating feature built into them, making food sovereignty a social and comfortable event. Gardeners can pause for a coffee klatch, taking a load off and sharing advice about reaping the most fruitful harvests. And when their tomatoes need tending, they can use the benches to keep tools within easy reach.

"The population using that garden, it's more difficult for them to bend," said Yaneth Londono, Links for Greener Living executive director. "They will be able to garden in a nicer way now. They don't have to bend and they can move around the bed more easily."

Links for Greener Learning runs eight community gardens throughout Niagara, providing residents access to fertile land for growing their own food. Over the years, the environmental charity has built 20 gardens, turning them over to schools and other user groups to operate.

Part of Links for Greener Learning's mandate is to offer programming that addresses environmental conservation, social welfare and food insecurity. Many of those initiatives have been supported previously by NCF, including its Eco-Kids Summer Camp and Earth Day celebrations.

Without that support, it would be difficult to meet the demand for the organization's services, including access to those more accessible raised garden beds in Welland.

"We're a small organization and don't have sponsors or get many donations, so the grants allow us to do bigger projects," she said. "We wouldn't be able to do this without these grants."

Experiencing the Joy of Life

And Carousel Players, Niagara's flagship professional children's theatre company, thinks children across Niagara should get a chance to experience that joy with their families.

Building on the success of its newly created Niagara Children's Festival, which was launched in 2024, the theatre company is bringing its magic to more children across Niagara, with special events in Pelham and West Lincoln in May 2025. A **\$15,000 Community Grant** from the Niagara Community Foundation will give rural families a chance to experience live theatre close to home, in addition to supporting community events and free programs during the festival's main weekend in May.

Carousel Players has spent 53 years bringing live theatre to schools, but the Children's Festival brings theatre to families.

"We want parents to be part of the kids' experience with theatre," said general manager Annie Slade. "We think it makes the experience stronger."



In addition to half days of programming in Pelham and West Lincoln featuring Carousel Players productions of Pop! Pop! And Hare & Tortoise, craft workshops, live music, face painting and games, the festival will also feature a Bike Parade with decorated bicycles travelling as a parade through downtown streets in St. Catharines and a community market at Silver Spire United Church. These free events round-out a jam packed weekend of festival programming that includes performances from theatre companies travelling to Niagara from BC, Quebec, and the UK!

Slade said support from the Niagara Community Foundation also supports bursaries for local youth to attend Carousel Players Summer Theatre School and other drama classes. She said research shows that children who participate in live theatre have a chance to experience the world from a different perspective, and in-turn, understand more about themselves and the world. "It opens your mind and it opens your heart, and you feel changed. It's magical," she said.

"It's so important to give children the opportunity to broaden their horizons and to experience the joys of life through the arts," Slade said. "We are thankful to the Niagara Community Foundation for uplifting that goal."

Room to Heal

For children who have experienced trauma, having a safe, supportive space where they can simply be kids again is life-changing.

Thanks to a generous grant from NCF’s **David S. Howes Fund**, the Kristen French Child Advocacy Centre of Niagara created just that with its new multi-purpose play and activity space.

What was once a dimly lit room in the centre’s basement is now a welcoming hub for therapeutic programming that features a rock-climbing wall and sensory room to help children emotionally regulate through textures, comforting lighting and sound.

There’s also an open area for activities, a reading nook, and mini-stage for performances. Full audio-visual capabilities, allowing for movie screenings, music therapy and interactive play, complete the room that was designed using a trauma-informed approach.

The NCF funding, worth **\$27,500**, contributed to outfitting the transformative space with furniture, lighting, artwork, sensory and kinetic play equipment, and some audio-visual gear.

“Before, we made do with what we had,” said Brian Bratt, the centre’s executive director. “Now, this space allows us to serve more kids in more meaningful ways. It’s more than just a room—it’s a tool that helps us rebuild trust, self-confidence, and resilience in the children we support.”

The centre provides critical services for children and youth who have experienced trauma from abuse, neglect or witnessing violence. The new space inspires healing through therapeutic art, drama, music therapy, and play. It’s also home to after-school programs, and Camp Acorn, Niagara’s first and only trauma-informed day camp, which the NCF supported in 2023 and 2024 with Summer Camp grants.

Each year, the Centre helps about 2,500 children and their families. Thanks to grants from NCF and donors, the organization is better equipped to ensure that every child who needs help receives it—today and for years to come, Bratt said.

“Kids walk in and immediately feel at home. They tell us they love it here. They feel safe. That’s exactly what we hoped to create.”

Storytelling for Truth and Reconciliation

Crystal Lavallee was elated to champion the voices of elders and community leaders from Frog Lake First Nation (Unipouheos 121) in her mini-documentary **Frog Lake: The Untold Stories**.

The film brings to light the oral histories surrounding the 1885 Frog Lake “Massacre,” a tragic event that the community refers to as a ‘terrible occurrence.’

Another moment of encouragement came when Lavallee screened the film for a hard-to-impress audience of Grade 8 students in Niagara.

“The feedback I got from the students, especially the Grade 8 boys, was, ‘I enjoyed how the elders shared their stories and explained what happened to their families. It was very well put together,’” Lavallee said. As the founder of I Am Compelled Collective, a national educational charity, she focuses on sharing the often-overlooked or forgotten oral histories of Canada’s First Peoples to advance reconciliation. “Our stories must be shared,” she emphasized.

Thanks to a **\$1,500 Mini Grant** from NCF, local residents and students were able to view **Frog Lake: The Untold Stories** in Grimsby last summer. The grant funded community screenings and discussions.

“The Niagara Community Foundation empowered us to remove barriers for learning and played an instrumental role in bridging the gaps in understanding between Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities,” Lavallee shared. “These shared stories are essential for healing in the Frog Lake community. They also provide knowledge to non-Indigenous people—I watched stereotypes change after they listened to the stories and discussed their learnings!”

The creation of **Frog Lake: The Untold Stories** began during the pandemic, when Lavallee shifted her Indigenous storytelling efforts from theatre to film to reach a broader national audience.

While traveling in Alberta, she stopped by Frog Lake and spoke to Elder Larry Quinney, who passed down the knowledge his ancestors had shared with him. She was compelled to help!

This lesser-known chapter in Canadian history has been a source of shame for generations in Frog Lake, as the community has long carried the burden of blame for the “massacre.” **Frog Lake: The Untold Stories** features the voices of both elders and youth, sharing the lasting impact of this terrible occurrence and their collective journey toward healing.

When over 500 Scouts, Guides, Cadets and leaders gathered at Camp Westaskiwin on the outskirts of St. Catharines on a cold and wet weekend in April, they stayed warm because they worked hard and because they knew they were helping to make a sensitive watershed healthy for generations to come.

A **\$30,000 Environmental Grant** from Niagara Community Foundation meant Scouts Canada could plant thousands of trees, shrubs, and grasses in a project that will reduce flooding, curtail erosion, and restore native species to a landscape harmed by generations of human activity.

And for Bryce Honsinger, Troop Scouter of the 57th Grantham Optimist Scout Troop and one of the organizers of the event, it's not just the improved environment for the Twelve Mile Creek watershed that was planted that day.

Youth from across Niagara and beyond, ranging in age from 6 to 18, formed friendships, learned important environmental lessons, and invested in making their futures healthier and safer. Providing opportunities for young people to connect with each other and connect with nature is what will make Niagara continue to be a healthy and caring community, Honsinger said. "If we want the environment to be in good shape, we have to have practices that are sustainable." Getting the youth involved is "a systemic way to make a good ecological impact," he said. "Let's get stakeholders out here who use the camp and get them invested in the project. That's a big part of Scouting—we want kids to be safe, but we want them outside and we want them engaged."

Before the planting day even began, ecological assessments were conducted and many hours were spent removing invasive species such as multiflora roses and buckthorn. Hundreds of Christmas trees were gathered to serve as buffers

against bank erosion. Shading the creek and slowing the water down will eventually help restore water quality so aquatic life can thrive once again. NCF Grant funding was instrumental in securing the equipment to anchor Christmas trees and improve habitat on 126 m of creek bank.

"If we come together as a community, anything is possible," Honsinger said.

"We had a fantastic weekend," said Scout Will Bigford. "Friendships were fostered, skills were learned, and memories were made—helping our favourite camp and its variety of ecosystems thrive."

Offering Dignity

Visiting a food bank or a community closet can be intimidating for people who are already on the margins of their communities, but Start Me Up Niagara’s Mobile Closet program is working hard to remove barriers.

A \$14,200 infusion from Niagara Community Foundation’s Community Grant program enabled the Mobile Closet to embark on an ambitious translation, cultural sensitivity, and first aid mental health project to make customers feel comfortable and secure.

The Mobile Closet, which offers a free, season-appropriate pop-up shopping experience in locations across Niagara, was noticing more newcomers to Canada were taking advantage of the service, but volunteers had to rely on Google translate to communicate with them, said Lynn McIntyre, program coordinator. That got especially



tricky when the topic was personal hygiene items, she said, but the grant allowed McIntyre’s team to arrange for all signage to be translated into French, Arabic, Turkish and Spanish.

The grant also allowed Mobile Closet volunteers to participate in sensitivity training, to help them better relate to newcomers with different customs, to Indigenous clients and to 2SLGBTQIA+ community members. For example, in some cultures, it’s a sign of respect to a woman to address all communication through her male shopping escort, McIntyre said. Volunteers also learned how non-verbal communication, such as head nods or grabbing items from another shopper’s hands, can mean different things in different cultures, and they learned how to serve transgender clients with sensitivity, respect, and proper pronouns.

“The cultural sensitivity training was invaluable,” McIntyre said. “There were so many things we didn’t understand, and we learned so much.”

Twenty of Mobile Closet’s volunteers also took a first aid mental health course, which gave them important skills to serve customers well.

“We want to treat people as special as we can,” McIntyre said. “It’s the humanity of it; we offer dignity.”

Because when everyone is made to feel like they matter and are part of the community, everyone benefits, she said. “Being more inclusive, having more equality—it creates a sense of belonging. All these little things add up...to a kinder, gentler Niagara.”

Summer Camp For Everyone

Summers can be long and grueling for families of children with developmental disabilities, but when their kids can go to camp, everyone is happier.

A \$2,500 Summer Camp Grant to Community Living Port Colborne–Wainfleet meant 10 children could attend camp last summer, and more than a dozen parents got a much-needed break.

As part of its mandate, Community Living Port Colborne–Wainfleet makes it possible for children with developmental disabilities to attend a local day camp—by assessing their needs and making a plan for adequate support. But those children often have siblings who would also enjoy a summer camp experience, and that’s where financial support from Niagara Community Foundation made all the difference.

Summer camp can be expensive and sending more than one child to camp can overtax a family’s budget, said Sara Wencel, Coordinator Children supports at Community Living Port Colborne–Wainfleet. The grant meant siblings could attend camp together, Wencel said, which is good for everyone.

The children of the family enjoy a positive summer experience together, and sometimes having the sibling attend is a much-needed resource, who can help the child with a developmental disability enjoy the camp more.

This is the second year CLPCW was able to offer the sibling summer camp. The demand was higher than she could fill, and she hears from the campers and their parents how thankful they are. As well as the break it gave to them, which is especially important when children have high needs.

“My family is incredibly grateful,” said one mom. “This has provided my sons with a sense of belonging and they both thrived over the summer.”

BGC NIAGARA

Essential Upgrades With a Lasting Impact

Spending money to replace an HVAC system or purchase a curtain divider for a gym doesn’t sound like a lot of fun.

But the impact of the two grants in as many years from the **David S. Howes Fund** for BGC Niagara (formerly Boys and Girls Club of Niagara) to make such purchases is nothing short of exciting—especially for the people using the BGC Niagara facility in Niagara Falls, which benefitted from the upgrades.

It’s this kind of community support that allows us to continue on and build programs in the region. The lives of people are affected for the better.

In 2023 and 2024, the BGC Niagara received a total of **\$80,000** in grants, used mostly to replace the HVAC system servicing the pool. Without the proper ventilation the new system provides, the section of the 15-year-old building that houses the Junior Olympic-size swimming pool would deteriorate.

The organization, which serves both children and adults in Niagara, also used the funding to purchase a gym curtain, allowing the space to be divided and more programs to run simultaneously for different groups.



“This is what allows us to do the work we’re doing,” said Joe Macoretta, Chief Operating Officer for BGC Niagara. “It’s all part of the puzzle, and is important for us to continue doing what we do. With a facility like this, it’s about community impact as a whole.”

That impact looks like serving more than 6,000 local families each year. More specifically, it’s roughly 4,200 aquatics and recreation registrations, including programs like swimming, dance, martial arts, pickleball and Aquafit classes. It’s also 5,822 child and youth Zone program visits, which provides gym time for children between 6 and 18 years old, academic support and a hot meal five days a week. BGC Niagara served more than 138,000 meals and snacks in 2024.

Thanks to the renovations enabled by the Niagara Community Foundation’s support, those activities and services can continue uninterrupted. That’s something you can’t put a price tag on, Macoretta noted.

“It’s this kind of community support that allows us to continue on and build programs in the region. The lives of people are affected for the better,” he said. “The funding was the perfect amount to complete these projects, and kids are receiving support, growing and thriving.”

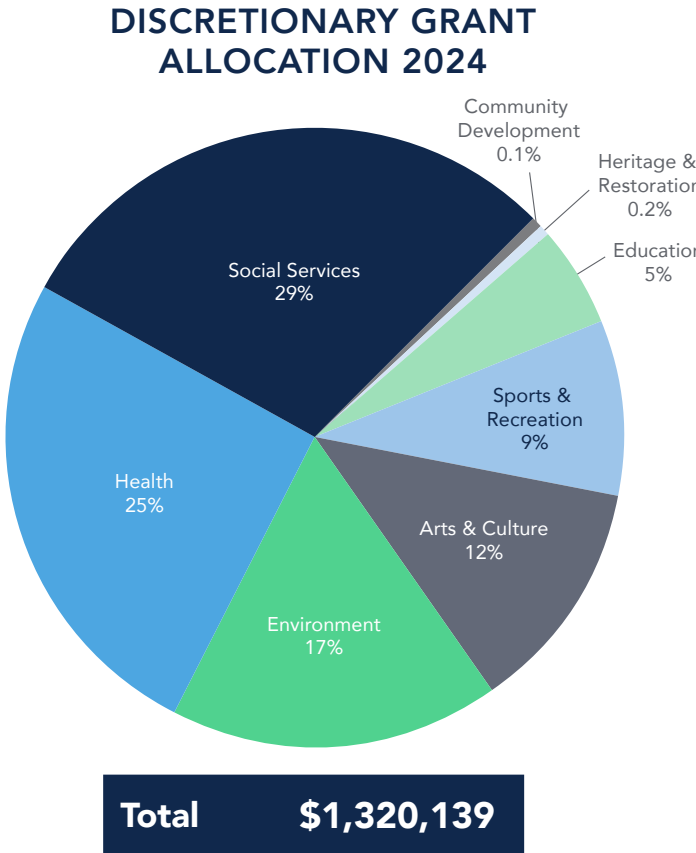
2024 Grants Awarded

Each application for our Discretionary Grant programs is evaluated by our volunteer Grant Review Committee, ensuring our grants are, meeting the greatest needs in Niagara, are making a visible and sustained impact and are being dispersed in an equitable way.

These Grants are funded by the earnings of our undesignated, discretionary endowment funds – **Niagara Fund, Community Funds** and **Field of Interest Funds**. Undesignated funds provide NCF with ultimate flexibility to meet the pressing needs of Niagara.

These grants are based on the terms of the fund agreements between the donor and the Foundation with respect to beneficiary organization.

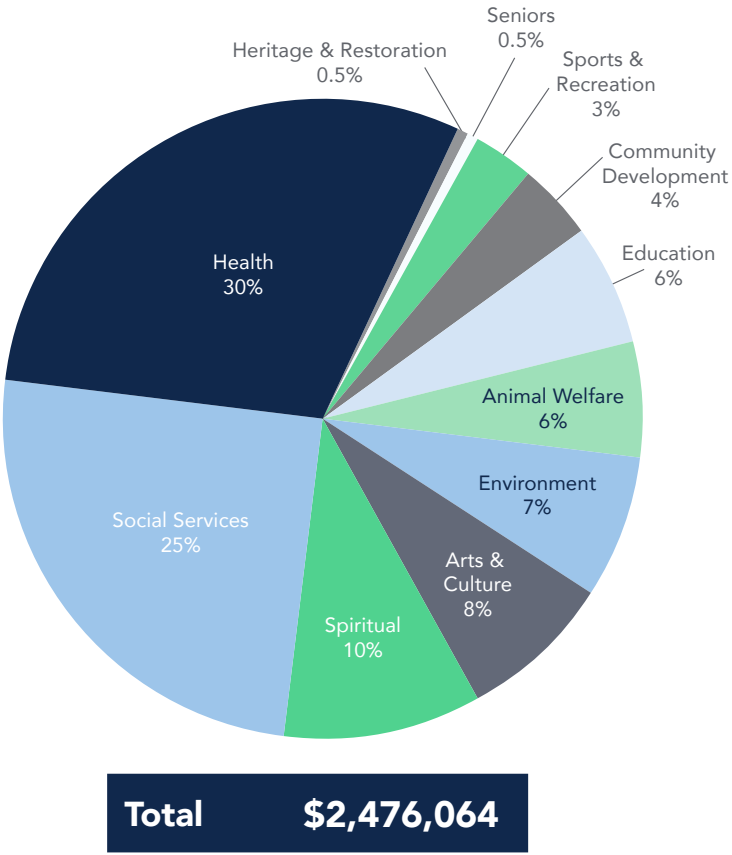

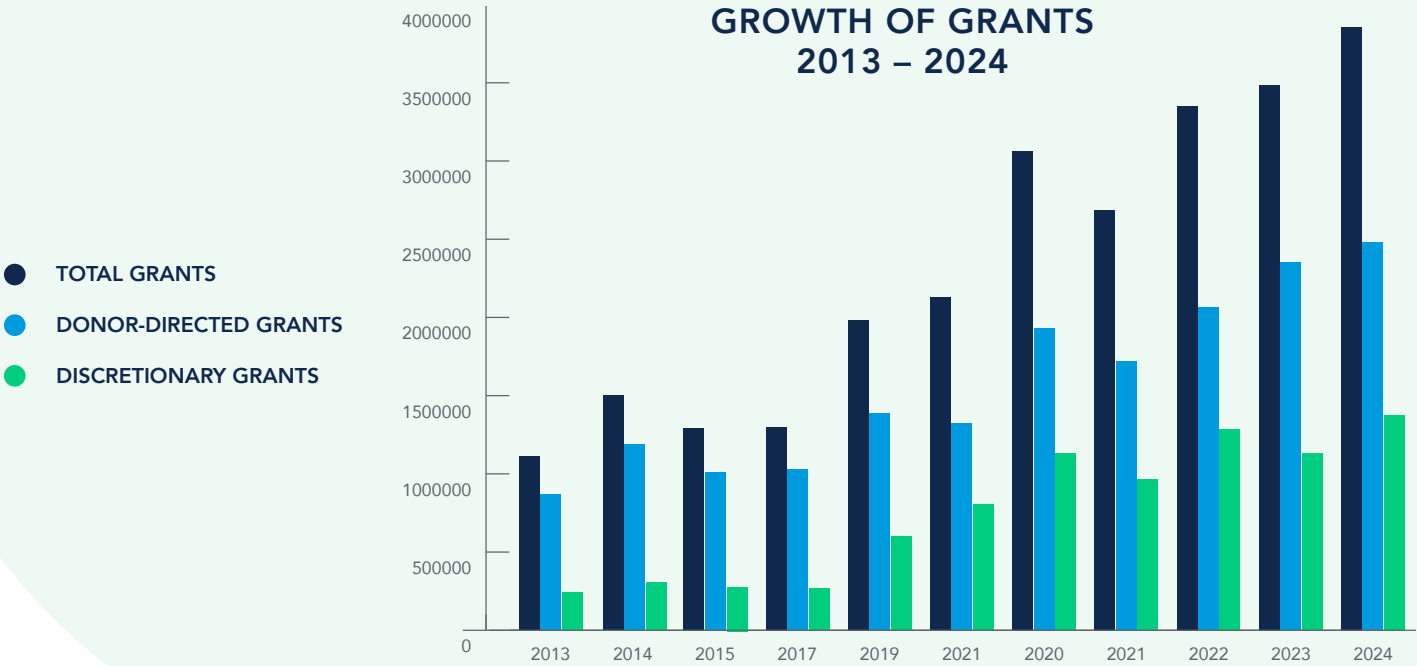

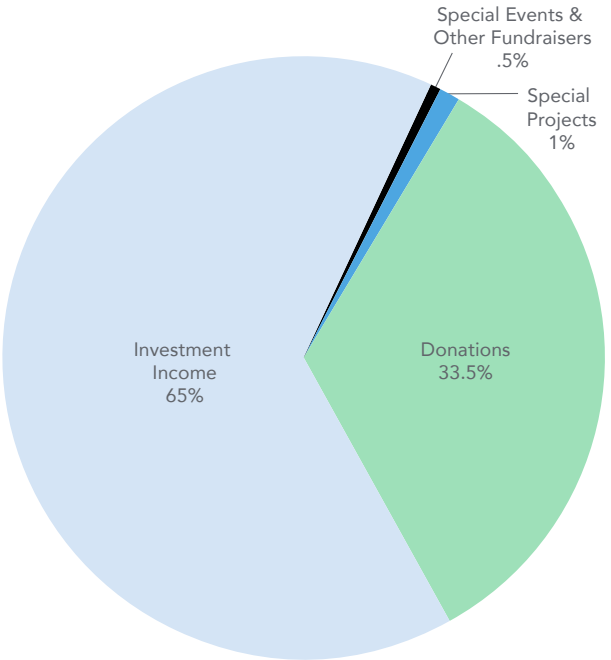

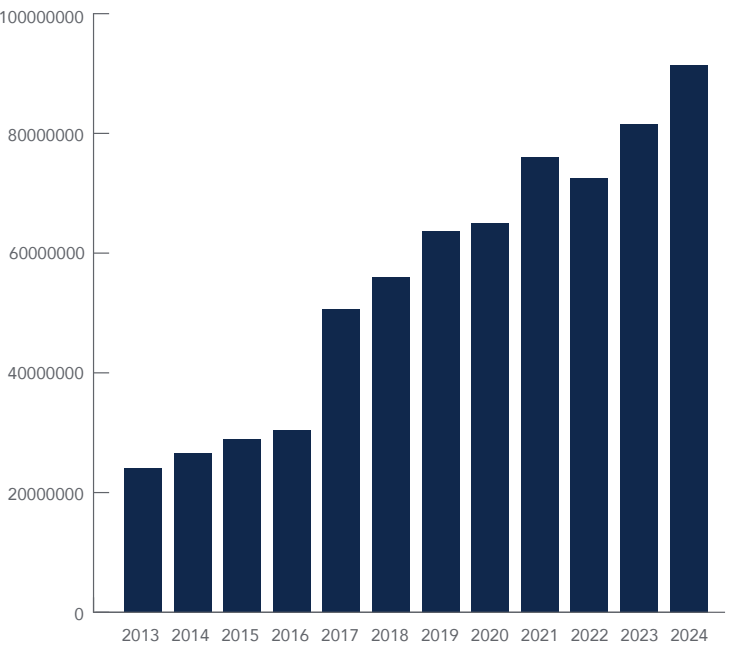

GOVERNANCE

The Board’s role is to set policy and to question, scrutinize and monitor the management of the Foundation’s activities. It is a role of governance as opposed to operational management and ensures that the affairs of the Foundation are being conducted in a manner that achieves its goals consistent with NCF’s mission. The Role of Board and Executive and the Scope of Authority policies are in place to delineate responsibility between board and staff. The Board has also adopted a Code of Ethics and Confidentiality policy for all staff and volunteers.


OPERATIONS

The Foundation’s staff is led by the Executive Director, who reports to an independent Board of Directors. Operating costs include asset development, charitable activities, special projects, administration and governance. Expenses for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2024 totaled **\$1,070,188**. Consistent with the community foundation sector, operating costs are evaluated by a ratio of total core operating expenses (excluding special projects) to total assets. For 2024, that percentage was **1.2%**, which continues to be below the range of community foundations of similar size and stage of development.

INVESTMENT FEES AND RETURNS

NCF’s investments are pooled with a number of other public foundations and charities in an investment pool with the Toronto Foundation (TF). This relationship has been in place since 2001 and is re-evaluated on a regular basis by the Investment Committee. The endowments are invested in accordance with the investment policy established by TF’s Board and are part of the NCF’s Investment Management Agreement with TF.

LONG TERM STRATEGIC ASSET ALLOCATION

The average investment fee paid for 2024 was 0.85% for funds in the Toronto Foundation investment pool. The investment fee is charged monthly to each fund on a pro-rated basis. NCF’s annualized five-year (2020 to 2024) rate of return is 6.26% and 6.54% since inception in 2001 (both net of fees). EXTERNAL INVESTMENT MANAGERS PROGRAM

In 2012 the Foundation created the External Investment Managers Program which allows assets gifted to a newly created Fund to be invested outside of Foundation’s Consolidated Investment Fund in a portfolio managed by the donor’s recommended investment firm. This program is available for advisors who have been licensed as a portfolio manager actively involved in discretionary investment management of segregated portfolios for a minimum of three years. The minimum donation required to participate in this program is \$1,000,000. There are currently six funds under the management in this program.

SOCIAL IMPACT INVESTING

As with all Social Impact Investment opportunities, NCF recognizes that although there may be a lower financial return compared to traditional investments, there is an equally important social and environmental impact alongside of the financial return. In 2012, the NCF Board made a commitment to invest \$500,000 in the Community Forward Fund (CFF), a social finance investment fund. In 2018, NCF entered into a \$100,000 partnership with the Fair Finance Fund (FFF) which lends to social enterprises that provide demonstrable social, environmental and economic benefits from across the food & farm sector. This innovative fund supports the future of local food in Ontario from seed to supper. 2024 saw a new opportunity with NCF investing \$250,000 with Rally Reader (<https://www.rallyreader.com/>) an online literacy platform dedicated to fostering literacy equity by nurturing a genuine love for reading through choice, support, and motivation. By providing an inclusive platform tailored to the needs of all readers, they ensure that every student, regardless of their background or learning differences, has access to the resources they need to succeed.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Board has a comprehensive Risk Management Policy covering legislative and legal, fiscal performance, financial reporting, management of volunteers, effective management & governance, economic risk and donor & volunteer stewardship. The Finance Committee reviews NCF’s exposure to risk and mitigants to address perceived or actual risks annually. NCF is exposed to the effects of market fluctuations due to changes in market prices caused by factors specific to the individual security or its issuer or factors affecting all securities traded in the market. While market risk cannot be eliminated, the Foundation’s Investment Policy addresses this risk with parameters for both asset quality and diversification.

OPERATING RESERVE FUND

In 2018 an Operating Reserve Fund was established with the accrued surplus revenue from our Operating Fund year-over-year. Operating Reserves are liquid, unrestricted assets the Foundation can use to support our operations in the event of an unanticipated loss of revenue or increase in expenses. The reality of market fluctuations have an impact on NCF’s source of income and an Operating Reserve Fund provides comfort to stakeholders that NCF has the ability to respond to a rapidly evolving financial landscape. The Foundation’s goal for our Operating Reserve Fund is six months of our annual Operating Budget to cover major expenses.

ACCREDITATION

In 2012 NCF received accreditation through Imagine Canada’s Standards Program. NCF was one of the first Community Foundations accredited in Canada. The program offers a Canada-wide set of shared standards for charities and nonprofits wishing to enhance their effectiveness in the fundamentals of governance, paid-staff management, financial accountability, fundraising and volunteer management.

EVALUATION

The Board has adopted a comprehensive annual process to evaluate its performance. The results of the evaluation are reviewed and actions to improve board performance are implemented. This process is done on a biennial basis with Foundation committees. NCF staff team participate in annual performance appraisals, which includes check-ins throughout the year. The Executive Director’s review is presented to the Board by the Board Chair.

COMPENSATION

The Board has established salary ranges for each of the Foundation employees. The ranges are determined based on reviewing similar positions within the community foundation sector across Canada as well as similar positions within Niagara. Ranges are adjusted regularly to reflect cost of living changes.

BOARD RECRUITMENT, ORIENTATION AND TRAINING

The Bylaws of the Foundation set out the Board recruitment process. Nominees from across Niagara are identified based on current board attributes and future strategic needs. The Board is comprised of 17 members who are elected for a three-year term, which can be renewed once. The term can be extended if a Director is serving as the Vice-Chair, Chair or Past-Chair. New Directors take part in a formal orientation program. Board training takes place at each meeting and additional opportunities are provided throughout the year for members to participate in professional development provided by Community Foundations of Canada.
